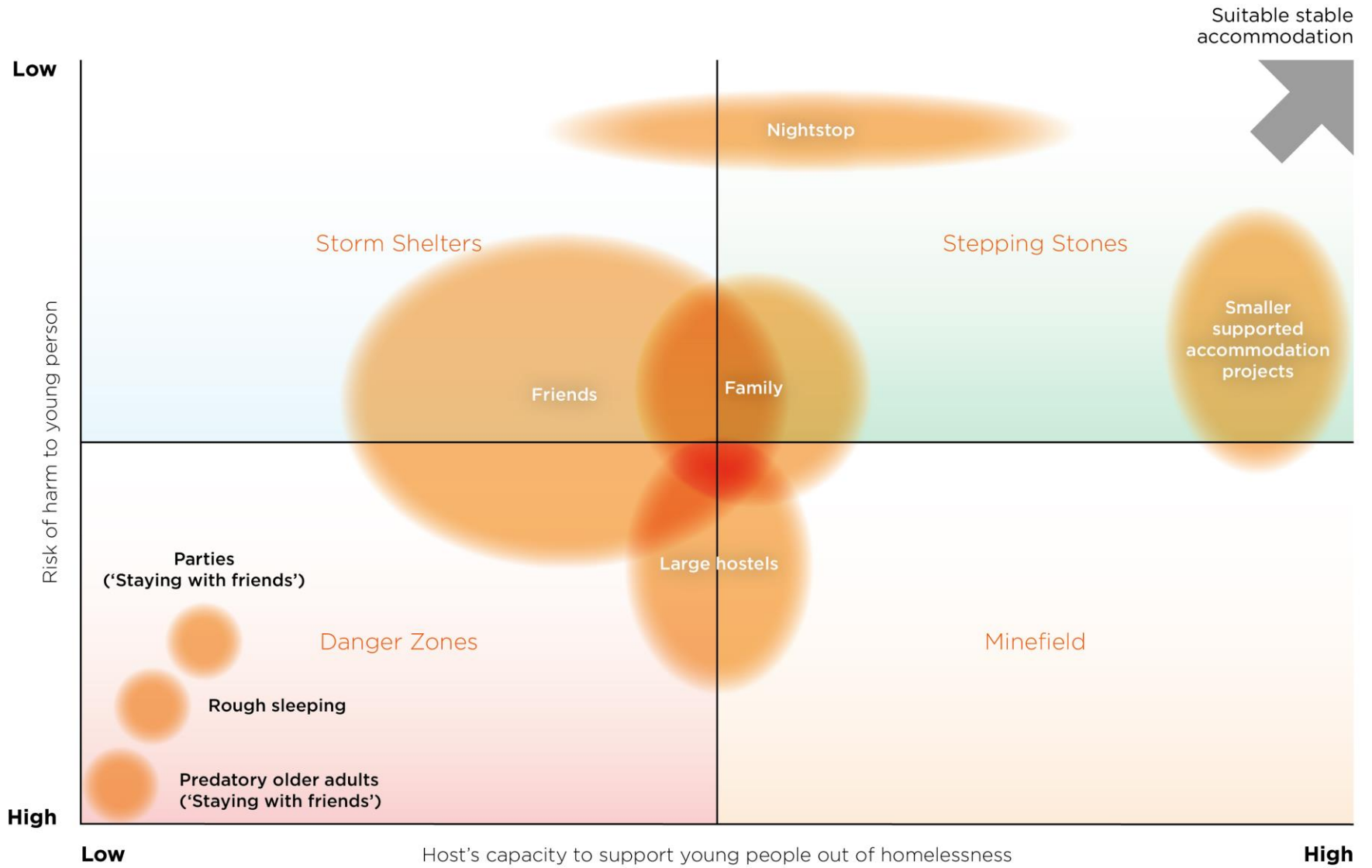

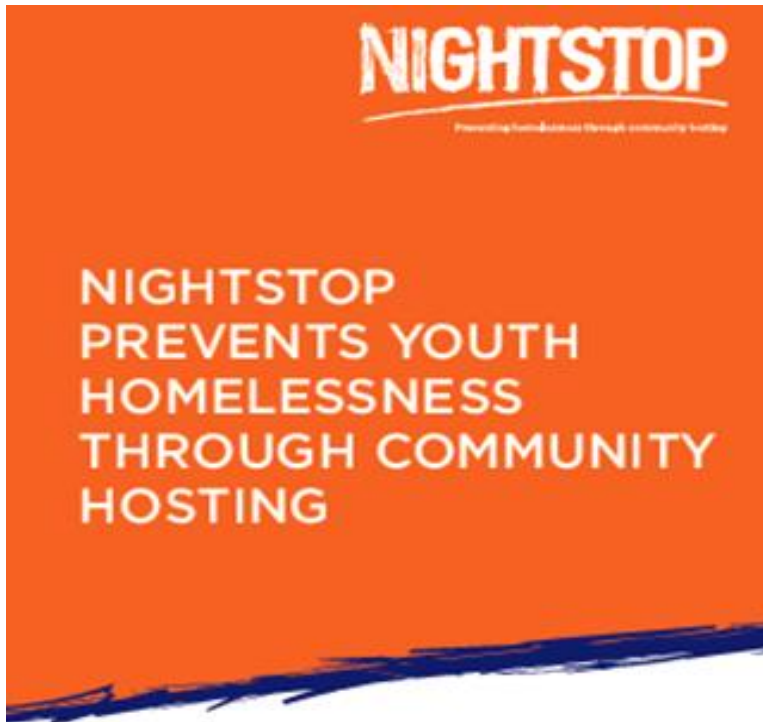
Stepping Stones

What does Nightstop do?



We provide young people aged 16-25 with:

-  A safe place to sleep
-  A warm meal
-  A shower
-  A listening ear

In our volunteer's homes.

The aim of Nightstop is to protect vulnerable young homeless people from sleeping rough or staying in dangerous places, and being exploited. To do this we also provide:

- Interventions to relationship breakdown that may have occurred to cause homelessness i.e mediation
- Partnerships with referral agencies to find suitable move on or return home

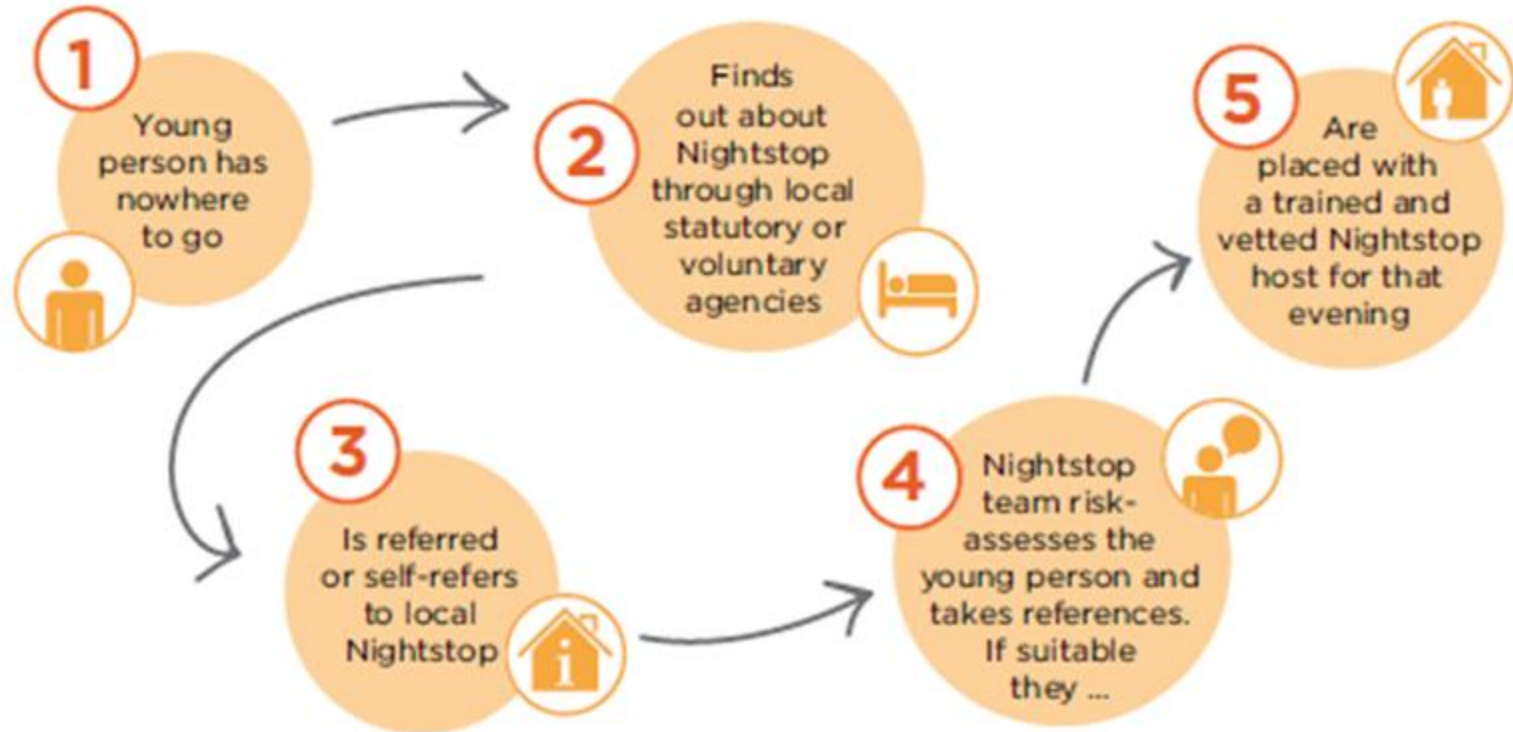




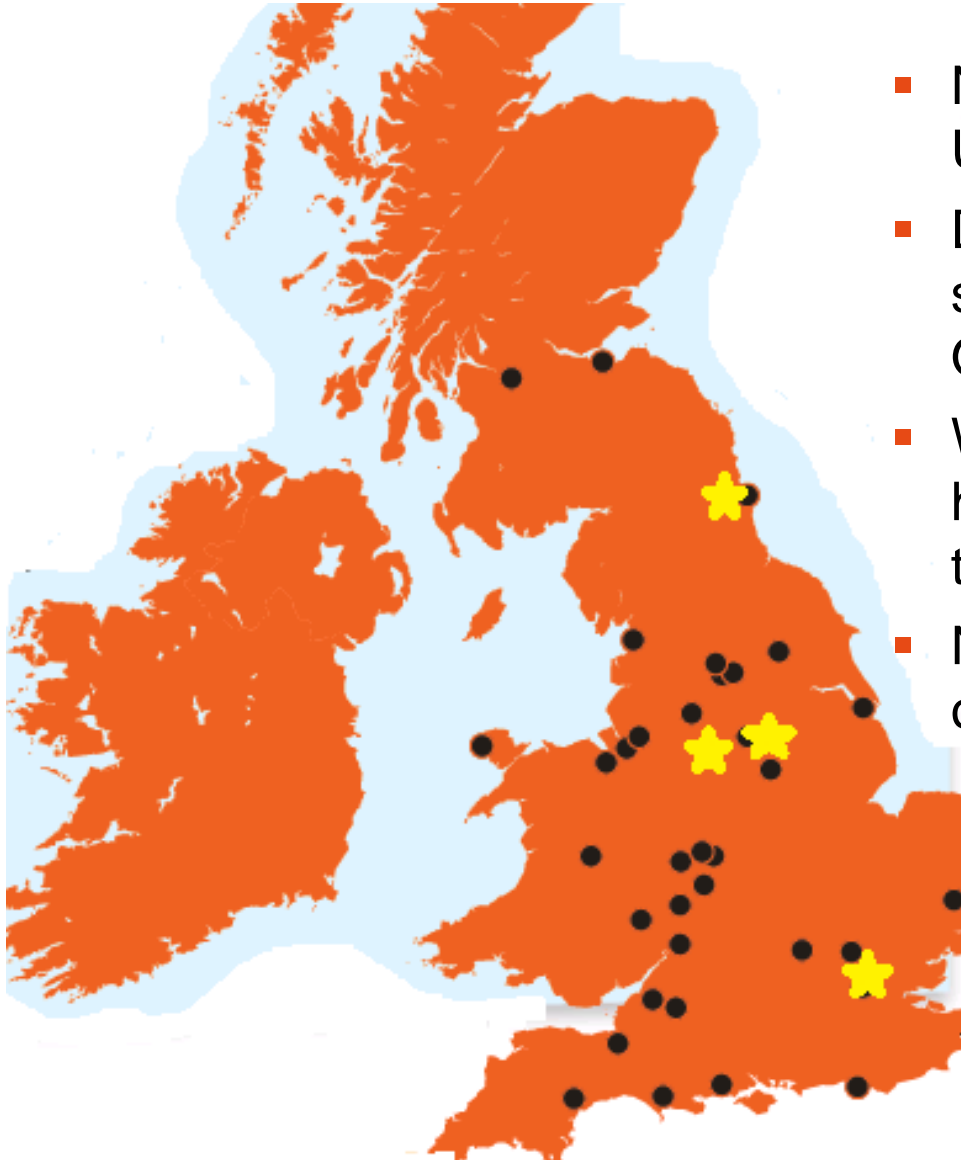

The Nightstop Network



- Nightstop reaches 45% of UK local authorities.
- Depaul UK deliver the service in London, Sheffield, Oldham and the North East
- We work with 29 youth or housing charities to deliver the service.
- Network has grown organically over 30 years.

Last year ...



794 young people came to Nightstop because of family breakdown,



168 refugee, asylum seekers and migrant workers placed.



and **280** because of relationship breakdown.



576 young people who were placed in Nightstop were in education, training or employment.



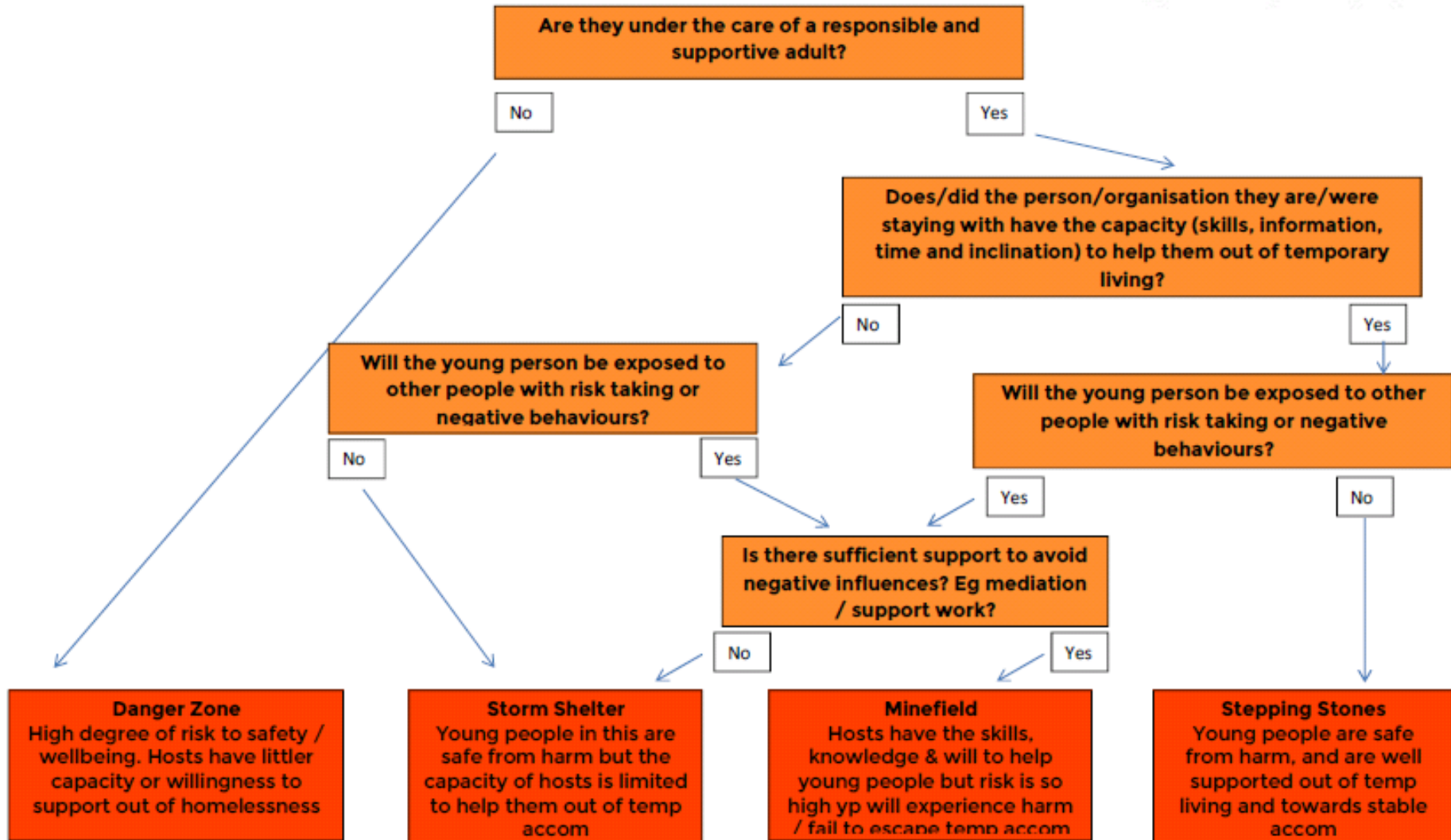
we supported **963** volunteers, including chaperones, mentors, drivers and hosts

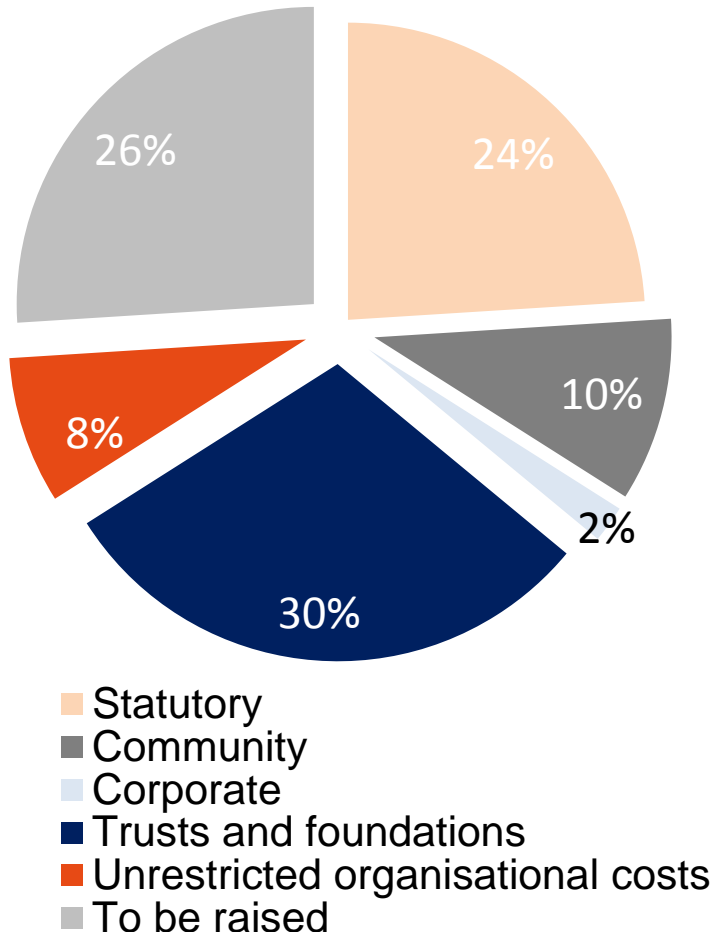


International Nightstop Network.

- Training and development
- Quality standards

The average local Nightstop



- Fundraised income is generally split between different sources
- Nightstop UK recommends to new services an income of c. £75k. This covers 1 x full time worker, on costs, and volunteer resources.
- Generally Nightstop services take 4-6 months lead in time, from expressing interest in the model to placing their first young person
- This timeframe includes becoming accredited with Nightstop UK, recruiting hosts, training, and building local relationships.

International developments

- Franchisees to pilot model initially, then look at developing own network
- Local organisation will be granted license for an area, and will be responsible for developing / delivering their network
- Still responsible for meeting the same quality standards, but shape of their network might vary country to country
- Two types of Nightstop int'l franchisees;

International developments



1) Subsidiary Nightstop Delivery

- Pilot with Depaul Ireland
- In discussion over past 3 years
- MOU in place, staff trained, toolkit provided
- Operational pending due to funding issues



2) Non-subsidiary Nightstop Delivery

- Launched with local housing organisation 360 Kids in York Region, Ontario, Canada
- Initial contact in 2015, funding secured in September 2016
- Launched accredited service in January 2017. Operational in March 2017
- Aim is in mid 2018 to start developing wider network with national partner
